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



From the Headmaster ...

It is my pleasure to introduce this latest edition of our annual School magazine, 'The Bradfordian'. Grateful thanks to everyone who contributed articles. I hope readers enjoy them every bit as much as I did.

On Speech Day we also look back and take stock. Let's do that first, and with characteristic BGS candour. Last year at Speech Day I said the following: 'Our School, our BGS, is in fine shape, and it needs to be. The capacity and propensity of future generations of parents to choose independent education for their children is of national interest. It's a good job that BGS is in a strong position ... Our School has changed and adapted over the years to maintain a robust position. We are doing so again in increments to ensure that a first-class BGS education is available to the widest possible cross section of families. Enhancing our provision, controlling costs, attending to income streams, raising funds for means tested Assisted Places and enacting a wider public benefit, these things are essential if our School is going to thrive in the future. Such is the stuff of modern-day, independent school leadership and life'.

At the start of the current academic year, when addressing my colleagues, I framed things a little more succinctly when I said that the: '... synergy of educational, commercial and public benefit priorities is clear, and every department has a responsibility to continue to deliver in all areas.' Moreover, '... an independent school that is going to stay the distance in these present times, and for the foreseeable future, must have equal regard for these three categories'.

One year later and little has changed in terms of the external environment or BGS strategy, although, next week, the nation goes to the polling booths, and some pressures are now more pressing than before.

These are times of opportunity and challenge for the independent school sector. How we respond - reflecting our educational, commercial and public benefit priorities - will define our schools for the foreseeable future. To that end, I am pleased my teaching colleagues were able to reach an agreement with our Governors when strike action over pensions was threatened. That individual outcome, which improves our resilience to future financial shocks, is, however, just one movement in a broader evolution of BGS that has be ongoing for some time and which must continue in order to meet challenges, safeguard the quality of education for our pupils and enable us to be nimble to grasp opportunities.

The likely imposition of VAT on the fees paid by parents, and removal of Business Rates Relief on the bills paid by the School, represent a double-edged financial sword. Both would have an impact, particularly when charitable status, and a responsibility to act accordingly and provide public benefit, remains. Such things are on the minds of those who choose to send their children to an independent school and those of us who choose to work at one.

We walk into this future with eyes open, and with a determination to take all necessary steps to enable BGS to thrive for the benefit of current and future generations of schoolchildren. Continued progress in support of our 1662 Fund for means tested Assisted Places and exciting enhancements to our Junior School are just two examples of initiatives to protect the inclusivity, character and positive impact of our School. Meanwhile, prudent business practice continues.

BGS is worth the effort. We remember that ours is a school of great character, one that makes a difference to the lives of others in a very broad sense in our locality and nationally. My introduction for the latest edition of our termly School magazine, 'Hoc Age', went thus: 'You get a strong feeling for what BGS is all about, the difference it makes to people, its substance and significance, when attending Old Bradfordian, alumni events. Happily, there have been quite a few recently including a 'sell out' social near St Paul's Cathedral to mark 40 years since girls were first welcomed at BGS. OBs of various vintage, including many recent leavers, gathered in good spirits to renew and strengthen friendships and forge new ones ... There is great warmth in our extended school family, and these qualities reflect formative experiences in the classrooms and corridors, fields and theatre, labs and library at BGS ... There is something special about our School."

As Headmasters do, I went on a bit more... 'This past term I've had the privilege, once again, to witness young people at work with a spirit of enquiry and personal ambition, compete hard and fairly at sport, perform outstanding music and drama, enter and succeed in various intellectual and practical competitions and challenges, make a difference through fundraising and volunteering opportunities, head off on Duke of Edinburgh expeditions and participate in growing numbers in our CCF - the list goes on and on. Those that embrace this wealth of opportunity get set for life. Little wonder that our OBs are such a wonderful, cohesive and colourful lot, and want to give back to support our School.

Our commitment to excellence and opportunity remains, even as challenges ramp up. And I couldn't be prouder of the young people in this hall today, reflecting all they have attempted and achieved, all they represent - and not just our prize winners. We have much to contemplate in the context of the long chapters of BGS history. There's a lot going on, to say the least. I wonder how the current episode of our school's story might read. And being a Headmaster, and by necessity therefore, a raging egotist (!), I wonder also how I might be judged?

Big questions. So, perhaps it's time for a little levity? And a lesson or two from the BGS archives regarding the judgment that ultimately comes down on all BGS headteachers.

Time for a prop, one that usually hangs on my office wall. This is a copy of a BGS artefact lately discovered in our archive. The original document, unbelievably, dates back to 1641. It is older than our Royal Charter. It's a serious piece of BGS and civic history. So, what can it be? The answer... a petition for the removal of the headmaster! I note some of the signatures of the Old Boys who signed it, familiar sounding BGS names like Dawson, Crabtree, Midgely, Crookes, Bowers, Taylor and Holdsworth. Youthful members of these West Yorkshire dynasties continue to walk the corridors of BGS today. Need I be cautious?

But why were they all so upset in 1641? Firstly, because travel to and from BGS was 'bad' (don't we still know it at times!); because education at nearby grammars had to be paid for, and it was likely that 'Bradford lads' would soon have to do likewise; and, this is my favourite one, because boys who lived outside of the Parish were classified as, wait for it, 'foreigners' – this is verbatim – 'foreigners'. I love it! If ever you needed an insight into the West Yorkshire psyche, look no further.

Spinning through the ages and our archives once again we arrive at another lesson from history for errant BGS headmasters, this time from the early (ish) 1800s. Regarding one of my predecessors, we find a letter from an Old Bradfordian, an Old Boy, who protested that: '... he [the Headmaster] detested the inclusion in the curriculum of writing and arithmetic ... [English and Maths in more modern terms] ... and declared that, if these were taught, all the respectable families in the neighbourhood would cease to send their children to the School.'

Well, we do teach English and Maths, and you folks in the Price Hall are still here. So, this Old Bradfordian was either wrong, or you lot simply aren't 'respectable'? I'll leave that thought with you! On balance however, this former headmaster might have deserved the jip he got. Under his watch, school inspectors observed that:

"All the work of the School consists of a lifeless routine, and I can see amongst the boys no evidence of interest in their work or a desire to do well." The headmaster of the time was a Mr Slack. You can't make it up.

I notice, however, that the Governors were unable to remove Mr Slack, even when he tried to sell off school furniture to an unsuspecting colleague. All of which gives me great comfort as I contemplate my own shortcomings!

By way of an epitaph for Mr Slack's time in office, I am drawn to the observation that he: '... frequently absented himself during school hours and is quite incompetent for his situation ... [and was] ... absent without cause at Blackpool for a fortnight in term time.'

Quite what Mr Slack was doing on his wayward fortnight in Blackpool is yet be discovered in our archives.

Mrs Hinchliffe has nonetheless instructed that I am not allowed to slope off to Blackpool for nefarious purposes unknown, which is probably a good thing.

Clearly, some of my predecessors have been judged critically. I reflect again, how might history view the BGS of the early 21st century? We face some headwinds. No question. But we keep our priorities in view and sleeves rolled up. We keep doing our best for the long-term future of our school.

I am biased of course. I love BGS. I think it's a great place to learn stuff and to work. And that must be true, because the all-seeing, all-knowing and wise Good Schools Guide told us so. They visited BGS last October. Here's an extract or two of what they said:

'Bradford Grammar School is a selective northern independent with a long and illustrious history. Academic rigour? Absolutely, but that goes hand in hand with impressive sensitivity, lightness of touch, genuine love of learning and sense of fun. Great facilities, super staff and a genuine inclusive commitment to social mobility' and, they said, 'there's a strong emphasis on good behaviour, courtesy, respect and kindness but nothing feels heavy handed.'

Lovely words. Of the latter-day Mr Slack - that would be me - they said: '... charismatic and commands the respect and affection of pupils, staff and parents alike.'

You know, I can hear you laughing! Governors have their heads in their hands. So perhaps it's time to move on and change tack ... and honour our tradition of saying thank you and goodbye to those colleagues who have left or are leaving this year, people like Sam Thrippleton (HR Officer and former Secretary to the Bursar), Jess Alred (Admissions and Marketing), Linda Kelly, Sidra Zubair and Keeley Scholes (Catering Assistants), Debbie Merckx (fellow Catering Assistant and one time wearer of various hats in the Junior School), Maryam Hussain (Biology Technician), Ashwani Kumar and Sian Harris (Estates), Robin Sharp (Development) and cleaner Mary Szablowski. Added together, Sam, Linda, Debbie, Ashwani and Mary have worked at BGS for 100 years, 34 of those from Mary alone, a wonderful commitment from these colleagues to our School.

Additionally, I am grateful to teachers, David Weight (Geography), Damir Mulavdic and Bob Page (both Mathematics), and Loretta Gibbons (Modern Languages) who have made valuable contributions at BGS during their recent fixed terms with us. Similarly, Laura Kelly, Hannah Moulds and Victoria Blaker have added great value to BGS sport during the course of their prescribed stints at our School and we offer them our sincere thanks. The same gratitude is extended to Specialist Sports Coach, David Birch, who has done much to reinvigorate our hockey programme in recent years.

Teachers of English, and architects of some wonderful theatrical productions, Julia Sharp and Sophie Seager leave BGS this year. We also accord our thanks to Phil Watson, (Mathematics) and Matthew Livesey (Biology) who left BGS earlier in the year, both having contributed widely to areas such as the Duke of Edinburgh Award and higher education advice. Rachel Miller (Sports), James Walton (Chemistry) and Dan Walker (Physics) move onwards and upwards to take up Head of Department roles. I am delighted for them, and it is pleasing to see BGS adding value to those colleagues who are actively seeking promotion.

Finally, we come to thank those colleagues who are retiring this year. Paula Tatham (Junior School Teacher) is known to many in this hall. She retires after a teaching career spanning 33 years, nine of which have been at BGS. Julie Ronksley (Geography) hangs up her gown and coloured marker pens after a second stint in the Geography Department. Julie began teaching in Oxfordshire in 1997, has been a Head of Department and also a Head of Faculty during her career. Chris Finch and I joined BGS in 2014. He began teaching at Allerton High School in 1985 and has taught at various grammar schools locally over a 39-year long career. Thank you, Chris, Julie and Paula.

Jane Chapman began her teaching career in 1987 at St Bees School, Cumbria and first came to BGS in 1989. After a short career break when her children were young, she rejoined BGS in 1996 and became the Head of the Classics Department 10 years later. Latterly, Jane has taken up the responsibility of being our Assistant Head Pastoral and Designated Safeguarding Lead on the Senior Leadership Team and, ever versatile, has also served as a Year 6 tutor in Clock House.

We should not underestimate Jane's influence as a role model for female, and male, pupils at a time when our School was transitioning from an all-boy's domain towards the balanced and diverse demography it models today. (This year, coincidentally, we celebrate 40 years since girls were first welcomed at our School.) Jane is also married to, and the mother of, Old Bradfordians. In short, Mrs Chapman is BGS royalty, and someone who has quietly but determinedly made changes for the advancement of our School.

Please join with me to show our collective appreciation for all BGS staff, support and teaching alike, and our leavers too, in the traditional way with a round of applause.

From the Junior School Headmaster ...

Junior School Prize Giving 2024

Junior School Headmaster's Speech

Good afternoon pupils, teaching staff, guests, parents and Governors. I am delighted to be able to welcome you all to the Price Hall for our Junior School Prize Giving afternoon.

A warm welcome today to Old Bradfordian, Umar Aziz Hussain (2010). Umar, we appreciate you taking the time to be here with us today to present the prizes and are very much looking forward to hearing about your career in VFX.

Today represents an opportunity to celebrate achievements over the course of the school year but also, importantly, to celebrate our Year 6 leavers and to wish them well as they complete the Junior School stage of their education.

I have decided to frame my remarks today around the theme of past, present and future which I feel is appropriate as the School continues to adapt and evolve whilst retaining our core values.

The Past - A potted history of Clock House.

If we were able to travel back in time 100 years imagine what would be different? We would be sat outside and not in the Price Hall. This building and the Price Hall wouldn't have existed, work on this building hadn't started in 1924, but the Clock House building was here. In fact, if we were able to travel back 300 years, Clock House would still have been here!

We are fortunate to have a written record of what it was like to live in Clock House before it was a school, and this comes from Lady Kirk. Lady Kirk was the daughter of R B Graham who became Headmaster of BGS in 1939.

These are her recollections and I wonder how much of this you can recognise:

'Clock House was a foursquare building, dating from the 17th century, with later additions. Through the porch, the front door opened into a panelled hall, with a big fireplace. There was a cosy stove there which ate coal but did help to warm the whole house (there was no central heating in those days). The over mantle was of sandstone, with the carved words 'My son, fear God and the King and meddle not them that are given to change'.




Straight ahead was the sitting room, with two window seats looking into the garden. The stairs were on the right-hand side of the hall, and my father's study door at the foot of the stairs.

We were excited by the Bogey Passage, a dark curving tunnel between the study and the dining room which led to the back door, the kitchen and the big room which had been built on to the front of the house in the late 19th century as a billiard room.

Outside there was a big garden, with formal rose beds. The high wall gave us privacy: the story is that the lady who lived in Clock House was engaged to be married to the owner of Cartwright Hall (in Lister Park), then a private house, and they enjoyed blowing kisses to each other from their bedroom windows. However, he split up with her, and she never wanted him to look on her again, so she had an extra four feet built onto the wall!

Opposite the front door there were steps to a grass tennis court and below that grass fields sloped down to the railway.'



Lady Kirk finishes her recollections by saying 'the new school was being built. The old school was down in the city, and the Junior School at Thornville, not far away.'

So, why Clock House? Lady Kirk said an obvious reason is the sundial on the face of the building - sundials were common in the 17th century.

The new Senior School building, we are in today was completed in 1939 and the Senior School moved in in 1945 (the building having been commandeered by the Army during the war).

The Junior School moved from Thornville to Clock House in 1975, and the building was remodelled and extended.

The School has continued to evolve since with the Clarkson Library, Hockney Theatre and Sports Barn and soon, of course, the Reception and Year 1 building for our four and five year old pupils, along with the enhanced grounds development.

The Present - So, a lot has happened this year with many highlights.

We hosted actual moon rocks and meteorites at the Junior School during Space Week. Mrs Watson and I were quite nervous as prior to their arrival we had to sign a number of very official forms saying we wouldn't lose them!

Microbits were introduced to enhance our computer curriculum.

Five Year 6 pupils made it through to the bonus round of the Primary Maths
Challenge and two through to the next round of the UK Junior Maths Challenge beating a number of Senior pupils in the process. Sorry, Dr Hinchliffe, but these are the facts!

Faith based visits ran in every year group to support our understanding of different faiths. Visitors were invited to school to speak to our children about the environment and COP 28 and medicine and plastic surgery to help victims of conflict overseas.

Earth Week was set up and run by the Eco Council.

There were notable successes on the games field with record levels of participation for all and team achievements. A special mention to our Year 6 Netball team who are North East Champions in their age group.

The creative arts are in good health, evident as Year 6 delivered a superb end of year production of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' - a team effort with exceptionally high levels of oracy and a number of memorable quotes, including my personal favourite delivered by Helena,"...though she be but little, she is fierce!" I will leave you to think about who wasin my mind when I heard that quote.

We also welcomed Julian Lloyd Webber to deliver a Cello Workshop and the Singing Children's Choir of Africa.

This year has seen the continued development of music with superb performances in the House Music competition and at the Spring Concert.

Magnificent Seven among A* winners at BGS

Several students at Bradford Grammar School achieved A* grades across the board in their A Level results.

Six students received four A* grades each with an additional student taking a self-taught extra fifth A Level and gaining three A* and two As.

The Magnificent Seven were joined by their friends and families at BGS, where many students had secured places at their first-choice universities.

Results revealed Bradford Grammar had secured a 100 per cent pass rate with one in five grades awarded being an ${\sf A}^*$.

Delighted students included Vivek C who gained four A*s in Biology, Chemistry, Maths and Further Maths. He will study medicine at Oxford University.

"I'm really happy with my results, particularly to get A*s across all subjects," he said.
"I took advantage of the school's support preparing for university interviews and the hard work has paid off."

Fellow high-flier, Tom T, gained four A*s in History, Latin, Maths and Further Maths and will study Philosophy, Politics and Economics at the London School of Economics.

"To get all four A*s is such a nice thing and I was relieved when I saw them," he said.

Pollyanna G-W was also one of the Magnificent Seven, gaining A*s in Classical Civilisation, Greek, History and Latin. Pollyanna joined BGS in Year 9 having previously lived in Athens. She was the only student on the A Level Greek course and will be pursuing her love for it by studying Classics at Cambridge University.

"The school really helped me follow my passion by allowing me to study Greek at A Level and the Classics department is amazing," she said.

Elsewhere Jonty A ended up with a staggering five A Levels, with A*s in Computer Science, Maths, and Physics and As in Economics and Further Maths. The teenager took an additional subject, Further Maths, halfway through his A Levels and taught himself much of the course.

"I didn't do anything special in my GCSEs, but I came into myself for A Levels and enjoyed narrowing down the subjects I studied. It was great the teachers trusted me and had faith in me to take on an extra subject." Jonty will study Physics at Durham University.

Headmaster, Dr Simon Hinchliffe, said: 'While we're delighted that our students have excelled academically, they've also achieved other great things during their time with us, representing their country in sports and becoming top musicians. They've managed to balance their training and practice while pursuing their academic endeavours, which is remarkable.

'We're proud of their results and the grounded, well-rounded individuals they've become. We know they'll go on to achieve increadible things.'









Ukrainian student triumphs with exceptional GCSE results

A Ukrainian teen who escaped the devastation of war in his homeland and endured immense personal loss, celebrated achieving ten GCSEs – eight of which were Grade 7 (formerly Grade A) and above.

Oles K fled Kyiv and came to the UK with his mother Mila in late May 2022 while his father, Roman, remained in the Ukraine until his untimely passing last summer.

The 16-year-old gained an Assisted Place at BGS where in August he learned he'd achieved ten GCSEs, including three 8s, five 7s and two 6s.

Said Oles: 'I'm so grateful to BGS, especially the teachers who have helped me on an individual basis. I had all the support I needed and one-on-one encouragement.'

Oles will study for his A Levels in Psychology, Business and History at BGS, and take the Extended Project Qualification, with aspirations to working in Law or Management.

During his studies, Oles faced significant hardship, losing not only his father but also his grandfather and great-grandfather in a short period. His father Roman, who had been volunteering in Ukraine, passed away from sepsis in June 2023, a condition initially missed by doctors. The events left Oles with no immediate family in Ukraine, and he was not even able to return to attend their funerals.

Oles said: The UK has become my home, and I see my future here. It's where I want to build my life and continue my education.'

Mila praised her son's hard work and commitment to his studies. She said: 'Moving to a new country, leaving behind everything familiar and dealing with the personal loss of our loved ones has been tough.

'But seeing Oles achieve such outstanding results has made it all worthwhile. We are deeply thankful to Bradford Grammar School for their support and for providing him with the opportunity to succeed.'

Simon Hinchliffe, Headmaster, said: 'Oles' extraordinary accomplishments are a testament to his dedication and determination to succeed against all odds.

'His journey from a war-torn country to achieving excellent results at BGS is nothing short of inspiring. We are incredibly proud to have such a resilient and courageous student in our community.'





Kind hearted teenager transforms personal tragedy into hope for others

A remarkable teenager, whose compassionate acts of kindness transformed his personal grief into a powerful force for good, was looking forward to university after achieving top A Level grades.

Oliver T achieved As across the board in Maths, Economics, Physics and Computer Science, at BGS and will study Philosophy, Politics and Economics at Manchester University.

During his A Level years, Oliver became a lifesaving stem cell donor through charity Anthony Nolan. His uncle, Jonathan Tuggey, who tragically passed away from leukaemia at the age of 13, was present in his mind throughout the process.

Moreover, the sporty teen, who played First XV rugby at BGS, also committed to running the Great North Run, the world's largest half marathon, alongside five of his school friends. They are raising funds for Sue Ryder, a charity that supported his mother, Amanda, before her untimely death from cancer when Oliver was only two years old.

Oliver said: 'The Great North Run is my way of honouring my mum's memory and giving back to a charity that supported her. Everything I do is driven by the desire to make both my parents proud."

Oliver joined the stem cell register with a DNA saliva swab in November 2022, following an Anthony Nolan presentation at BGS about the charity's life-saving work connecting donors with patients in need.

Jemma Hay Bryant, Youth Engagement Coordinator at Anthony Nolan, described the teenager as 'inspirational'. She said: 'It's incredible that he became a lifesaving stem cell donor while completing his A Levels."

Looking to the future, Oliver aspires to work in public service or in law, motivated by a desire to contribute positively to society.

Dr Simon Hinchliffe, Headmaster at Bradford Grammar School, said: 'Oliver's achievements are a profound testament to his character and dedication. His academic success is remarkable, but it's his extraordinary commitment to helping others that truly sets him apart.'

Said Ben: 'It's really good how the Brownlees give back to the next generation. They're very humble and down to earth which is nice to see. Loughborough has a really good triathlon programme so I'm looking forward to progressing there."

Student who broke his neck celebrates GCSE results

A teenager who had spinal surgery after breaking his neck in a mountain biking accident was delighted to gain 10 GCSEs - all Grades 7 and above.

BGS student Tim J spent three months in a neck brace following lifesaving surgery at Leeds General Infirmary after the accident in July 2023.

The keen sportsman had been having fun with his friends at Shipley Glen when a jump went wrong and he fell from his bike, fracturing his neck and rupturing a disc at the top of his spine. Surgeons later said his full-face helmet likely saved his life.

The 16-year-old was all smiles as he picked up his GCSEs, which included one 9, four 8s, and 57s. He said: 'I'm over the moon and very happy with my grades. The non-stop support from both school and my family and friends made recovery a lot easier. I wouldn't be where I am without the school and I'm grateful to them.

His mum, Juliet, added: 'This is a super proud mum moment! We're all so grateful Tim is alive and well and he needs to take all the credit. His calm and quietly determined attitude has paid off.

He simply wants to do well and enjoy the life he could have lost."

Tim's father. Gareth, a GP, said the accident had come as a shock to them all, particularly when MRI and CT scans and X-rays revealed the true extent of his injuries. The teenager underwent surgery to remove the ruptured disc and put in a false disc with plates across his vertebra. Tim spent three months in a rigid neck brace, wore his school PE kit for five months and his friend helped him with his bags.

Simon Hinchliffe, Headmaster at BGS, said: 'We're so proud of Tim for keeping positive and moving forward with his life and continuing his studies despite his injury. He's been through an extremely traumatic time but come through it with resilience and grace. He's an example to our other students and we know he'll continue to thrive at BGS.'


On 6 March, Clock House children enjoyed participating in the annual House Music Competition.




1. Year 2 - Building friendships on **Induction Day**

2. Year 3 - DT



1. Year 2 - DT lesson





Reflecting on their experience, Emaad described the journey as exciting, offering them a glimpse into running a business. He added how he felt like a 'mini businessman'.

The pupils managed to raise a profit of £117.38, which they donated to the children's charity, Make-A-Wish Foundation, exemplifying their commitment to giving back to the community.

Significant progress has been made in the Junior School development project. The new Reception and Year 1 building looks spectacular and is beautifully situated within the School's campus, alongside the original Clock House.

The building's interior has been decorated and equipped with state-of-the-art fixed furnishings.

It is a contemporary and spacious setting which draws in plenty of natural light and is a superb space in which our very youngest pupils will learn and flourish.

Ancillary works have progressed, including a brand-new playground complete with a challenging climbing structure, a tunnel, reading teepee and mini roadway for tricycles.

These exciting new spaces are located behind the original playground and will be brought into everyday use with the Junior School boundary extended into the woodland area.

You're one of the Junior School's Reading Ambassadors, David. What does it entail?

It's where kids from Years 2, 3 and 4 read to those who are in Year 6. They can choose a book from the library or bring one in from home. The younger ones like the Biff and Chip books which I used to love reading. I like the adventure part of them and how they meet different people, and you learn about their history. They're fun and educational. As they're reading to me, I ask them questions such as if they like the characters, if they've read other stories by the author or if they were in that position, what would they do? I try to get them to enjoy it and engage.

Rare space rocks land at Clock House

Clock House pupils had a 'once in a lifetime chance' to get their hands on rare samples of moon rocks and meteorites during a series of science lessons earlier this term.

Pupils were encouraged to learn more about the Universe during a week-long interactive experience of astronomy and were given the opportunity to touch a 1.2 billion-year-old piece of Mars rock and a 4.3 billion-year-old nickel meteorite – the latter of which had fallen to Earth from space. The lunar samples were collected in the late 1960s and early 1970s during some of NASA's first manned space missions to the Moon.

Year 4 pupil, Jacob L, said: 'It was really enjoyable, especially the experiments. My favourite was the footsteps on the moon experiment with sand and flour.'

Amelia S, also in Year 4, said: 'It was a once in a lifetime chance to have the moon rocks in school. We got to touch the Moon. It was really incredible.'

During the manned space missions to the Moon, a staggering 382kg of material was brought back to Earth – mostly for use by scientists, but small quantities were used to develop educational packs.

On Friday 2 February, our gymnastics teams travelled to Sheffield for the annual Yorkshire Floor and Vault and the Milano Team competitions, the first time both have run alongside each other.

The floor and vault involved the gymnasts performing individual floor and vault routines, and in the Milano competition they performed an additional team floor routine. This year we took a range of experienced and new gymnasts which included boys – a BGS first for these competitions.

The U14 floor and vault team consisted of pupils from Years 4 to 7 performing in an older age category. They performed their routines and vaults to perfection, with very little errors made.

These gymnasts were crowned Yorkshire champions and now qualify for the National Finals in May.

Our U13 mixed team consisting of Misbah N, Bea J and Issac R entertained the judges with a synchronised team routine which also placed them in first place, making them Yorkshire champions and they now qualify for the National Finals later in March.

Such amazing achievements for our mixed team gymnasts and the first Yorkshire gold medals the school has ever won!





Ethan's Cross Country Journey

Ethan P is a Year 5 pupil and talented sportsman. He is a successful runner, holding the school records for Year 3 300 metres and Year 4 600 metres. In recent times, he has started to achieve great things in the long-distance running category and as such he has been interviewed about his cross country journey.

Ethan's mum noticed that he was a fast runner from a very young age. When his family lived in London, he went to Junior Parkrun every week which is a 2k race. Ethan also used to attend an athletics class at the Sir Mo Farah Training Track at St Mary's University in Twickenham, near to where he used to live. When he moved closer to Bradford, he began running for the West Yorkshire club, Ilkley Harriers. Although he didn't begin running in West Yorkshire competitions, Ethan still trained hard, practising up to seven days a week.



Below are some of his responses to a recent interview. We wish Ethan and his team continued success for the future:

At what age did you begin long distance running?

I was eight years of age.

Have you had any successes in recent races?

I have! I finished first in an inter-school XC race and third in the Bingley Harriers Schools XC races back in September. I came 14th in my most recent West Yorkshire league race. The West Yorkshire league is made up of some of the fastest runners from each of the local clubs. I run in the under 11 category which is both Year 5 and Year 6, so I'm one of the younger runners. In the last race, I came 14th out of approximately 40 runners.

How often do you train?

My running schedule varies a lot but includes Parkrun, a 5k race on a Saturday morning. My best time for this is 21.59.

What club do you run for?

I run for the Ilkley Harriers.

Do you want to be a cross country runner when you are older?

I may do. I'm also considering being a sprinter, but you never know what the future will bring.

Have you ever achieved higher than West Yorkshire (e.g., county, national)?

I'm hoping to get to Yorkshire next academic year.

Do you recommend cross country to others?

If you have good stamina and know when to pace yourself, yes, but if you don't, it will be tiring.

As I woke up trembling with excitement, my emotions were going on a scary roller-coaster!


It was the day of the Floor and Vault National Finals in Stoke-on-Trent (21 April).

Laura excels in the University of Oxford's Quantum in Pictures study

Last summer, Year 13 student Laura K took part in the Quantum in Pictures study, an educational project used to teach quantum physics via the pictorial method to UK schoolchildren – who then collectively beat the average exam scores of Oxford University's postgraduate physics students.

The experiment involved 54 schoolchildren, aged 15-17, who were randomly selected from around 1,000 applicants.


Laura spent two hours a week in online classes and after eight weeks she was given a test using questions from an Oxford postgraduate quantum physics exam. Here is what Laura had to say about her experience: 'From June to August last year, I took part in the Quantum in Pictures programme led by Oxford University. It was a study to show that high school students can learn quantum theory, previously only taught to undergraduates.

I participated in weekly lectures and seminars to be introduced to the quantum world. The course ended with an exam, and I'm thrilled that I passed it – I really enjoyed the experience!'

Ross McOwen, Head of Year 13 was delighted to hear of Laura's contribution to the experiment: 'Laura's participation, hard work and success in the study is hugely impressive, and certainly speaks to the high-calibre and capability of Laura, the physicist.'

Young Carers Mentoring Scheme Returns to BGS

The Young Carers' mentoring scheme has made a very welcome return to Bradford Grammar School, after the pandemic and external funding cuts made it unfeasible to run successfully for the past couple of years.

Thanks to the generosity of the Parents' Association, the programme is back up and running and has already made a significant impact on some of Bradford's most vulnerable young people.

Every Monday evening, a dozen Young Carers from across Bradford come to spend time in our Sixth Form Centre to receive tuition and mentoring from Year 12 volunteers. Our volunteers offer them academic and emotional support, as well as advice on how to revise effectively. This not only improves the young carers' grades, but also gives them confidence in their own ability and, for a short time, they can focus on themselves and not who they are caring for at home.

The two hours are mutually beneficial, as our students have developed useful tutoring and mentoring skills. One pupil who volunteers with the programme said: 'I have thoroughly enjoyed my experience with the Bradford Young Carers' scheme. It is incredibly fulfilling to help other people and it has helped me gain confidence when speaking to new people as well as developing transferable skills that will be useful in later life as I'm aiming to become a teacher.'

The programme will continue running until April.

Teachers were asked to share their interests and from student responses to photography competitions, the Photography Society was created.



We like taking action photos (planes, cars, football, sport, etc). This skill may be used to take photos in other areas in various ways. We have shared our most popular and liked images.

3. Freddy B, Year 9:

I take photos of landscapes when I go on holiday to places like Northumberland. I also like to take pictures of buildings and fascinating rooms like the Winter Gardens in Blackpool. I then edit and enhance colours using filters to bring out the vibrancy of the landscapes as well as taking photos in black and white which enhances the texture and contrast of the photo.

I take landscape pictures of beautiful scenery and also portrait photos of trees, bushes, rocks, etc.

I like to take my phone on walks because I usually take photos of whatever catches my eye rather than planning it. I often edit my photos to make them more vibrant and colourful, which I think has a nice effect on pictures of nature. 
is dramatic and noir. I also enjoy taking pictures of busy environments and looking at them after and seeing all the colours against a black and white filter.

It has been an extraordinary year for Computer Science at BGS. We kicked off with our highest-ever participation in the CyberCenturion challenge, a national cybersecurity competition.

Seven teams from the school took part along with 450 teams from across the UK and British Isles engaged in two intense rounds, showcasing their prowess in identifying security vulnerabilities across various operating systems. Notably, we proudly cheered on our inaugural all-girls team as they advanced through the initial rounds to secure a spot in the National Finals.

The finals, hosted at Media City in Salford, saw Eliza S, Fiona L, Eloise B and Ruqaiyah A join 14 other top-tier teams from around the UK. Competing head-to-head, they demonstrated remarkable skill in uncovering vulnerabilities across three distinct operating systems, ultimately clinching the tenth position. It was a moment of immense pride for both the girls and the BGS community.

Further triumph awaited us in the realm of Lego Robotics.

The First Lego League competition combines robot building and programming with crafting innovative projects centred around a designated theme. Finalists were drawn from 1,800 teams nationwide. This year saw BGS represented by two stand-out teams, 'The IncrediLEGOS' and 'Lego of My Bricks'. The teams were made up of pupils from Year 7 to Year 13. Both teams emerged triumphant in their regional contests, excelling in both robot performance and innovation.

The pinnacle of the competition, the National Final held in Harrogate on 20 April, witnessed 72 teams vying for top honours in robot games and innovation projects.

Both BGS teams made it and shone brightly, with 'Lego of My Bricks' clinching the top spot for their innovation project, and 'The IncrediLEGOS' earning the esteemed Judges' Motivate Award while securing eighth position overall.

Beyond the thrill of competition and accolades, it's heartening to witness students developing a genuine passion for the subject, forging lasting friendships, and collaborating in ways they might not otherwise have the opportunity to do.

We are incredibly proud of the dedication, talent, and camaraderie demonstrated by all our students, and we look forward to building on the resounding success of this year.





Triumph in the BPhO Physics Challenges

In addition, 13 students from Year 12 also participated in the Senior Physics Challenge, all achieving awards. Special recognition goes to Shishir S, who attained a gold award, positioning him in the top 7 per cent of entrants, a testament to his exceptional problem-solving abilities.

BGS Handmade Club joins #knitthestripes

The BGS Handmade Club was delighted to be a part of the community project #knitthestripes run by Sustainability Sorted and The Little Craft House to show climate change in Bradford through knitted scarves. Jody and Fiz visited BGS in March to tell us about the project and 'cast us on'.

Together, BGS contributed 12 scarves to the project. The display was featured in Victoria Hall in Saltaire as part of the Arts Trail on 5-6 May, and it visually represents how the climate has changed in Bradford over the past 170 years – from the opening of Salts Mill by Sir Titus Salt in 1853 to 2023, using data collected by the Met Office in Lister Park, just opposite school.

Each scarf represents a specific year, and each year's colour depends on the average temperature that year. The darker the blue, the cooler the temperature; the deeper the red, the warmer the temperature.

Pupils and staff thoroughly enjoyed knitting their 166cm scarf and were wowed by the final piece. Did you see it? We are excited to get involved in our next group-based community project, for Bradford's City of Culture 2025. Watch this space!

Fashion Show 2024





Future Innovators on the Factory Floor

Making the 10-minute walk down Frizinghall Road to Ernest Cummins Printers, the A Level students were excited about seeing the industrial application of the design theory they were studying at the time.

Over the past four years, the DT department has taken the opportunity during Bradford Manufacturing Week to visit the local factory to complement the 'Paper and Boards' unit. On the surface this topic may not sound overly exciting, however teaching is complemented by hands-on experience as well as industry insight and a design competition judged by a leading senior designer at UK Greetings, a Dewsbury based greeting card design studio.

Visiting the Ernest Cummins factory allowed students to compare printing processes, such as digital and offset lithography, as well as finishing techniques including foiling and embossing. Seeing the machines running as well as speaking with the staff who maintain the operations and oversee quality control, embedded their theory knowledge by bringing it to life.

It is important that we provide these opportunities for students to see manufacturing taking place and be exposed to people and places they may not normally come into contact with.


We also went swimming, ice skating, watched a local ice hockey session, took trips into the town of Jasper, ate huge ice creams and chilled out in the outdoor hot tub.


Spending time with friends doing a sport you love is a real privilege and has created lifelong memories.

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A Morning of Magic and Literacy with Ross Welford



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
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Sporting Achievements

Lucinda L and Tilda H both competed in the prestigious Horse of the Year Show (HOYS) at the National Exhibition Centre in Birmingham in October.



It was still going to be a challenge having watched GSAL clean up in Round One of the English Schools Swimming Association Relays earlier in October, however, the strength and depth of the U15 and U18 age groups helped narrow an April 2019 points deficit of 57, down to just 20.

Twenty-nine BGS girls, led by Captain Carla B, travelled to Harrogate Ladies College to unleash a 48-point thrashing. An undefeatable U12 team combined with strength in the U14 and U18 was enough to secure victory.

The team acquitted themselves with the utmost professionalism against a late arriving St Peter's. The St Peter's team never relinquished their lead, but there were some outstanding swims from Martha J and Finlay J, as well as U12 Evie S who raced seven times to compete the ranks.

Charged solely by a BGS 'roar', the atmosphere at Woodhouse Grove was electric. The volume produced by a 36-strong team was enough to extract from WHG staff a request for quiet (we did not oblige them!) and spur two nail biting victories from George N and Laura K. A close but clear win for BGS, 236 vs 220.

There is always a warm welcome from the Ripon GS captains to a light-hearted fixture with Ripon GS. The choppy 25-yard pool challenges the swimmers. Ripon took the spoils in the relays, which could have been disastrous given they are worth double points, but individual strengths were to be our saviour, BGS triumphing 240 vs 217.

The inaugural Yorkshire Schools Swimming Cup took place at St Peter's in January. We secured overall fourth place and had great fun watching swimmers squirm in their weaker strokes.

In what turned out to be our final inter-school fixture (and win) of the year, a disappointing turnout from WHG U18s robbed some of our Year 13 of a final swim for school. However, our students seized the opportunity to serve our team by organising pupils, starting races, and scoring events. WHG staff were duly impressed, and we were grateful for their dedication. This year, four BGS teams were county winners at the ESTTA Team competition. The U19 girls team of Evie and Emma defeated Ackworth 3-2 with Evie winning both singles matches and Emma one. The U13 boys also defeated Ackworth and the U16 and boys defeated Kettlethorpe, Beckfoot and Carlton Bolling with the U13 girls defeating Beckfoot.

In January, BGS hosted the Zone finals of the English Schools for winning county teams from the North East. All BGS teams competed well with the U19 girls first, the boys U13 second and the girls U13s second.

Two girls teams competed in the regional finals, the U19s qualified for the ESTTA finals finishing second to the ESTTA Champions. The U13 girls were unlucky not to qualify. Evie and Emma competed well in the finals defeating Burnham School but losing to Chellaston School and Royal Russell.

Individually, Muhammad C and Ellie S came second in the West Yorkshire Schools Individual competition in the U16 boys and U13 girls. Well done also to Ben A and Hamnah C, Clock House individual winners, and Shishir S and Anees K, Senior School Individual Winners, Years 9-13 and Years 7 and 8.

This year five pupils and Mr Crabtree completed a Table Tennis England Coaching Course. Alekss B, Evie D, Shishir S, Muhammad C and Harris N helped coach younger students and each other as part of the course.

Alekss came second in the Pride of Table Tennis Awards, which was richly deserved. His commitment and willingness to help and encourage others has been remarkable. Schools Team Tennis (Years 7-8 and 9-10)

This year BGS teams were entered in both Division 1 and Division 2 LTA schools team tennis leagues across all age groups. The previous year set a high standard, with every BGS team winning Division 1 and 2 of the West Yorkshire Schools Team Tennis.

This year presented tough competition, especially from Holmfirth High boys, who provided fantastic fixtures against our Year 9 and 10 boys. Our boys gained valuable match experience against county-level opposition, winning against all teams in the league.

The Year 9-10 girls team had a successful campaign, winning all their matches in the group stage. They have qualified for the regional knockout phase in September, and we wish them the best of luck in their quest to repeat last year's national finals appearance.

In Division 2, BGS teams won three out of their four leagues, with the Year 7-8 girls and boys, as well as the Year 9-10 girls, emerging victorious against local competition.

Year 11-13 Cup

In this year's Year 11-13 Winter Cup, the girls teams qualified for the Northern Finals in Sunderland for the third consecutive year. To reach this stage, they defeated Leeds Grammar School, Wakefield Girls' High, and South Hunsley School. Unfortunately, the boys team faced disappointment. After last year's narrow loss to Altrincham Grammar due to a coin flip, this year they fell short against Yarm after beating High Storrs, Birkdale, and Leeds Grammar School.



At the Northern Finals, the girls faced tough competition against Stonyhurst and the eventual winners, Strathallan School. Despite a valiant effort, including a nail-biting shootout loss to Stonyhurst, the girls could not overcome Strathallan's depth. Ava R was a stand-out player, winning all her matches except against Strathallan. Special mention goes to Anna B and Amelie B, who played their final Year 11-13 Cup for the school.

Bradford League

This year, the U15 and U18 teams aimed to build on their success of winning the Bradford Tennis League for two consecutive years. The Bradford League has been an excellent platform for rotating players and providing opportunities to play singles and doubles. This year, we managed to involve 33 different players across the teams. Despite some closer matches due to this rotation, both the U15s and U18s won their leagues, marking their third consecutive league title. The toughest competition came from Cleckheaton Tennis Club, whose quality players led to a shock loss at the season's end. However, the U18s had already secured the league title. The teams will be presented with their trophies at the Bradford League presentation evening at Ilkley Tennis Club in October.

Glanville Cup

In this year's Glanville Cup, the goal was to surpass last year's result of reaching the regional semifinal. The boys started strong with a straightforward 12-0 win against Woodhouse Grove. In the second round, they faced a talented Ampleforth team in tough, windy conditions. Despite some shaky doubles matches, singles wins from Shishir S and Will B secured a 4-2 victory and a valuable home fixture in the next round.

In the third round, the team faced another strong opponent, Stonyhurst, a school with a solid tennis academy. The boys' performance marked significant progress, with singles wins from Lucas A, Shishir S, and Will B. Although Stonyhurst managed to bring back both doubles matches, a shootout win by Shishir and Will secured the boys' place in the regional final.

The boys were just one match away from reaching the national finals, facing Ilkley Grammar. Despite a strong challenge, they found themselves 3-1 down after singles and lost both doubles matches, meaning Ilkley qualified ahead of us. Although it was disappointing to go out at the last hurdle, the team's progress was evident.

Eton

Last year's annual trip to Eton was a great success, with pairs picking up more wins and Jameela T and Katy H reaching the last eight of the U13s. This year, Katy moved up to the U19s to partner with Ava R. The girls won all five matches in their qualifying group, progressing to the last 32, where they defeated a Cranleigh pair 6-1, 7-6, marking the first time a BGS pair reached the last 16 of the U19s girls tournament. Although they faced a strong Eastbourne pair in the last 16, the experience was invaluable for these young players.

There was also success in the U13s, with Jameela T partnering with Ruby R. The girls won their qualifying group and progressed to the last 16, where they faced Kings High Warwick, Queenswood, and Wimbledon High. Despite losing to Queenswood, the girls finished second in their group and qualified for the last eight. They were eventually defeated by Bristol Grammar, but finishing in the top eight was a fantastic achievement.

The boys' first team also reached a milestone, advancing past the first round for the first time by defeating Cranleigh. Although they were ultimately outmatched by a strong Warwick side in the last 16, the experience of competing against the best teams was invaluable.

Individual Success

Throughout the year, several individuals achieved notable success. Four of our Year 12 and 13 students earned their Level 1 tennis coaching awards, with Will B securing employment in New Zealand —a superb opportunity to travel and work.

Jameela T has added to her trophy cabinet, winning multiple Grade 5, 4, and 3 tournaments. Recently, she gained her first U14s Tennis Europe world ranking points in Bosnia and Croatia. Jameela also partnered with Ava R to win the Yorkshire County section of the Road to Wimbledon, earning them a spot in the National Finals on grass.

Ava R has also added to her collection of silverware, winning multiple tournaments and enhancing her national ranking.

Aberdare Cup and Year 9-10 National Finals

The top highlights of the year were the two national finals reached by the girls teams. After winning Division 1 last year by defeating eight schools, Jameela T, Ava R, Katy H, and Evie S won the Northern Finals after a shootout victory against Wilmslow High in Sunderland. The girls progressed to the final four teams in the country, competing against Queenswood, Kings High Warwick, and Talbot Heath – schools with multiple national-level players. Despite tough competition, the girls finished 4th overall, a superb achievement and a significant milestone in BGS Tennis history.

In the Aberdare Cup, the girls first team had a superb run, making it to the National Finals. They defeated Pocklington, South Hunsley, St Peter's, and GSAL in the regional qualifying round, with stand-out performances from Katv H, Ava R, and Jameela T. At the National Finals in Nottingham, the girls faced the top 16 school teams in the UK. Despite a tough draw against a seeded Millfield School team, they secured a 14thplace finish nationally - a remarkable achievement considering the competition started with over 300 teams. With only one senior player, there is much more to come from this young team.



Conclusion

The 2023-24 academic year has been a stand-out year for BGS Tennis, with two National Finals, two last 16 finishes, and a last eight finish at the ISTA Championships. There have been multiple individual successes, and the tennis program at the school continues to grow. I look forward to the 2024-25 year with new additions to the program and the continued development of our existing players.

Water Polo

Unable to secure as many games as we have had in the past against St Bede's and St Joseph's (SBSJ), it was a harder run into the English Schools this year.

The team worked hard to limit the damage, and the more experienced Fred D and William M maintained a wall in front of goal that Hadrian would have been proud of.

All in all, it was a good season - this showed in the final water polo outing of the year against the Old Bradfordians (OBs), which finished 13 vs 5 in favour of the OBs - a scoreline that in previous years may have been more reflective of the half time score!

Netball tour to Sri Lanka


The Senior Netball squad enjoyed an action packed ten days in Sri Lanka at the start of the summer holidays.
