

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








Search for Bradford Grammar School

There have been green shoots in Rugby as the Year 7 & 8 squads have breathed new life into the storied history of BGS rugby, with rich enthusiasm and team spirit at the heart of it all. The U15s attended the Langley School National Festival for the first time, for a truly enriching experience competing with the great and the good, including household names such as Wellington and Brighton College. There has also been the presence of individual excellence with Jacob H, Archie S and Harry S training with the Yorkshire Academy Squad.

On the water Edwin V L has been selected to represent BGS in Beach Sprint Rowing and has already competed in his first event at Bournemouth in October. A highlight for the Boat Club was the Ancholme Head. There were numerous victories across the age groups and many strong performances.

A total of 37 pupils represented BGS in table tennis this term. We had 8 teams in the West Yorkshire Schools table tennis team event, with the Under 13 boys team (Anees K, Henry A, Muaadh M and Rajdeep S) crowned champions and all other teams finishing second. The Under 11, 13, 16 and 19 boys teams and Under 16 girls will compete in the English Schools Area finals at BGS in January.

In Orienteering 30 students from across the age groups attended the British Schools Score Championships which took place in Kent.

Whilst the cricket season has long ended there has been notable success for Venus W being invited to train with England U19 and Alex W signing his Academy contract for the next two years with Yorkshire County Cricket Club.

It has been an excellent term of sport. Both individually and collectively, all pupils and staff have demonstrated high levels of commitment and care when representing the school, showing the best of BGS at fixtures and events, both home and away.

Rising cricket star Alex W has been awarded a two-year rookie contract with Yorkshire County Cricket Club (YCCC).

The signing in October followed Alex's memorable debut for the England U19 Young Lions in the ODI Tri-Series against Scotland and Ireland.

The Year 13 student, who plays league cricket for Bradford and Bingley, said: "It's a dream come true! It's what I've been working towards for a long time, and I'm really excited for the future."

Alex's standout moment in the Tri-Series came in the final match against Scotland, where he opened the bowling and claimed the key wickets of three top-order batsmen.

Alex's cricket journey began at the age of eight with Olicanian Cricket Club. His rise through the ranks of regional cricket started when he represented Yorkshire at U10 level. In recent years his development has accelerated, highlighted by his

BGS has played a significant role in Alex's cricketing journey. He has represented the school's cricket team since Year 6 and developed under mentorship of coach Mr Kellett.

Alex, who trains six days each week around his A-Level studies in Chemistry, Economics and Maths, added: "Balancing county cricket and school commitments can be tough, but whenever I get the chance to represent BGS, it's something I really enjoy. The support from my coach and teammates has been brilliant, and it's special to share those moments on the field with friends I've known for years."

Teacher secures spot in world marathon championships

Chemistry teacher Mrs Flaherty has earned a coveted spot in the 2025 world marathon championships event in New York.

The Head of Year 12 and 50-yearold mum-of-two has quickly made a name for herself in competitive running. Since taking up the sport, she has completed the London Marathon three times and, most recently, clocked an impressive 2:54:50 at the Berlin Marathon, finishing 5th in her age category.



Her performance earned her a place in the fifth annual AbbottWMM Marathon Tours & Travel Age Group World Championship, set within the 2025 TCS New York City Marathon next November. Over 1,800 of the world's top age-group competitors will come together for the event, and Mrs Flaherty will compete against the very best in her category.

She said: "I love the challenge running presents, both mentally and physically. It's a personal journey, and every race is an opportunity to push my limits and grow stronger. What I enjoy most is the sense of accomplishment when I cross the finish line, knowing that all my training and hard work have paid off."

Inspired by the success of fellow alum Emile Cairess, the second-fastest British marathon runner of all time, the family joined his local running club, Bingley Harriers, and quickly developed a shared passion for the sport.

Rebecca, a former Head Girl at BGS and now a student at Oxford, is also an accomplished Team GB runner. She clinched gold at the 2023 Under-20 World Mountain Running Championships.

"Usually, Rebecca is in the limelight," admitted Mrs Flaherty. "But it's been amazing to achieve success of my own in running, and hearing people cheer me on, even if it's as 'Rebecca's mum,' is such a special feeling!"

Mrs Flaherty's dedication to running involves a rigorous training schedule, averaging five runs a week, including a long 12-mile weekend run. She is currently training for the TCS London Marathon in April.

Isaac earns training opportunity with GB coaches

Talented gymnast Isaac R secured an exciting opportunity to train with British Gymnastics coaches, following his team's gold-medal victory at a national championship.

The 13-year-old Year 8 pupil competed in the Men's Artistic National Setworks Championships at Telford International Centre in early November, representing Yorkshire.

Isaac's impressive performance placed him among the top six gymnasts in his age category, contributing to the Yorkshire team's gold-medal finish. Isaac said: "It felt great. We won the year before, so we maintained our title!"

As a result, he was invited to train with top national gymnasts under the guidance of GB coaches at the National Sports Centre in Lilleshall in December. Isaac added: "They have high standards, so it will be amazing to be amongst them and to learn from them."

Isaac began gymnastics at just four years old. Training at Diamonds Gymnastics Club in Halifax, he now dedicates 18 hours a week to perfecting the six male disciplines: floor exercise, horizontal bar, parallel bars, rings, pommel horse and vault.

Looking ahead, his next goal is to qualify for the English Championships in March.

Dr Simon Hinchliffe, Headmaster at BGS, said: "Isaac's achievements are a testament to his dedication and passion for gymnastics. He balances an intense training schedule with his school commitments and sets a fantastic example for his peers. We look forward to seeing all he will accomplish both in and out of the gym.

Venus takes 121 wickets in breakthrough season

Venus W has had a cricket season to remember, taking an incredible 121 wickets while playing across multiple age groups and at a senior level.



The young leg-spinner, who is in Year 10 at BGS, has cemented her place as one of cricket's most exciting prospects, competing with players far older than herself in the U15, U18 and women's sides at Lancashire Cricket Club.

At the start of the season, Venus was one of four players promoted to the Thunder Academy, a regional hub for top female cricketers from Lancashire, Cheshire and Cumbria, following her success in the Emerging Players Programme.

Her subsequent performances earned her a call-up to the England U19 World Cup trials, where she was selected from a pool of 48 players to make the final 39. Although she narrowly missed out on the final squad for the upcoming tournament in Malaysia, her early inclusion highlights her promising potential in the sport.

Venus said: "I didn't make the U19 squad this time, but that's only made me more determined to keep improving. My goal is to play for England as soon as possible, and I'm focused on working hard to get there."

Venus juggles her intense training schedules with life at BGS, where she plays cricket as often as possible. She said: "The teachers and my friends have been amazing in helping me catch up with work when I've missed school for cricket. It's great to have that kind of support."

With winter training underway, Venus is already looking ahead to next season and is determined to push for a spot in the England squad once again. She added: "I want to go as far as I can in cricket and be the best I can be. I hope to play for England and reach the highest level possible." CAPTIONS

The challenge, known as the World's Toughest Row, will see Matthew and his three teammates spend around 35 days rowing from the Canary Islands to Antiqua, battling exhaustion, storms and 40-foot waves along the way.

Olivia, 12, feels both proud and nervous about her dad's daring adventure. She said: "I'm very proud of what he's doing, but I'll miss him a lot, especially over Christmas. It's scary to think about the dangers, but I know it's for a great cause."




Isha said: "Landing this role was exciting and another achievement to add to my CV. It's nice to be involved in a project for an older audience."

Remembering the Fallen


During the October half-term, the History Department took 57 Year 11 and Year 13 students to the Battlefields of France and Belgium.

From the dignified Bradford Pals memorial at Serre to the extraordinary Monument at Notre Dame de Lorette, the group reflected on the sacrifices of not only old boys of the school but also those of all nationalities who fought so bravely and made the ultimate sacrifice during World War One. The significance of remembrance is perhaps best expressed through the voices of the Year 11 students themselves.

One thing that resonated with me from the trip was visiting the memorial of the Battle of Neuve Chapelle, the first British offensive against the Germans in the First World War. This memorial commemorates 4,700 Indian soldiers with no known graves who gave their lives fighting for Britain in March 1915.

A key feature of the site is the inscriptions on the central pillar, written in Arabic, Hindi and Punjabi the languages of the holy scriptures of the Muslim, Hindu and Sikh soldiers who fought in this battle and throughout the war. These inscriptions represent significant respect from the British towards their soldiers from across the Empire, fostering a sense of unity and expressing gratitude for their contributions.

A particularly moving experience was the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate. This monument, inscribed with the names of 54,896 British Empire soldiers who died in the battles around Ypres and have no known graves, serves as a solemn reminder of their sacrifice.

Each night, at precisely 8.00 pm, traffic is halted, and a memorial service is held to honour those who gave their lives. This ceremony has taken place every evening since the 11th of November 1929, except during the Nazi occupation from 1940 to 1944. It is a powerful tradition that continues to this day and will continue, every night without fail, to honour those who served.



In the words of war poet Laurence Binyon:


"At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them."

CAPTIONS Jeremy also discussed the power of comedy writing as a way of processing life's difficulties, sharing personal stories of how he draws from real-life experiences. One particularly memorable example was the fate of his childhood pet tortoise, which met an unfortunate end. Jeremy explained how he turned this upsetting event into a comedic horror scene, creating a character a veterinarian who unintentionally kills every animal he treats. In one scene, the veterinarian tries a new method to treat an elderly woman's tortoise, with comically disastrous results. "A bit of truth at the heart of it brings the scene to life," Jeremy noted.

> The creative writing workshop was a highlight, guiding students on how to unlock their own storytelling potential using tools like mind mapping and drawing on their personal experiences. Jeremy emphasised the importance of boldness and self-discovery in writing. When asked for advice on breaking into the industry, he said, "Find out who you are that process never really stops. You start by reading, anything, and everything. Learn and pay attention to what you love. Be bold in trial and error, tune into your passion, and understand who you are."

He also encouraged students to discover their own voice by exploring films and literature that deeply resonate with them. "Writing is based on what you love," Jeremy explained, adding that by following what excites or moves them, writers will naturally find their unique style. "Learn what you love and become a scholar at it" he advised.

Jeremy's visit left a lasting impression on the Sixth Form pupils, many of whom left the workshop feeling inspired to continue developing their writing skills and pursue their creative ambitions





Bradford to Drax: An Insightful Energy Journey

In October, Year 6 at Bradford Grammar School visited Drax Power Station, the largest power station in the UK, to learn about energy production. This was the first time BGS had visited Drax Power Station, and I'm excited to share my personal experience.

Drax Power Station is located on the River Ouse, between Selby and Goole in North Yorkshire. It is the UK's largest renewable power station, using biomass (small pieces of wood from the USA and Canada) to generate electricity. The energy produced is sold to various electricity companies.

Upon arrival, we were guided by staff to a building that resembled a classroom, where we dropped off our bags and sat on benches. We began by answering some questions before learning about the process of turning biomass into electricity. We were also told that the wood used is renewable because the trees are replanted. As we would be entering a noisy area, we learned some hand actions to help us understand each stage of the process.

Next, we played a few fun minigames, such as filling a city with electricity using blocks and making a fan spin. After lunch, we boarded a bus that took us to the main station. As the station came into view, we spotted the large domes, which we were later told were made from the same material as

bouncy castles. These domes are inflated with fans and have concrete and steel inside to support them. We also saw a turbine on display.

Our group was then split in half for a minibus tour, which I really enjoyed. The tour guide explained the entire site to us, and we had the opportunity to ask questions about Drax, electricity, and power generation.

Finally, we entered the main building. On the way, we saw trains transporting biomass to the station. Before going inside, we made sure to put on all our protective gear, especially headphones, to protect our ears from the extreme noise levels. Inside, we were able to see most of the processes in action.

We ended our fantastic journey with a group photo and then returned to drop off our protective gear. We answered the same questions from earlier to see if our opinions had changed. It was a magnificent journey; one I'll certainly remember.

"I like being in my classroom, and I like maths. I think school is fun and has good learning."
