
HEADMASTER'S UPDATE

Dear Old Bradfordians and friends of BGS, Welcome to this first OB newsletter of 2025. As soon as I mentioned the Independent Schools Inspectorate (ISI) in the last digital letter they arrived at BGS! Which makes me wonder if prescience might be invited a second time and what or who I should mention in this edition? All answers on the back of a postcard please...

The pronouncements we receive in latter day ISI reports are less descriptive (and idiosyncratic!) than they once were. That said, we 'met' all the required standards and gratefully received some positive comments reflecting our hard work. A snippet of the ISI commentary is provided below:

"Leadership, management and governance are highly effective, with governors contributing a broad range of expertise to support strategic decision making and ensure accountability. Senior leaders analyse data effectively to identify areas for improvement, set clear priorities and drive initiatives that enhance teaching quality, pupil outcomes and overall school performance"

"Activities such as peer mentoring, volunteering and promoting diversity help pupils develop social responsibility, engage in their community and understand real-world roles and institutions"



"Leaders successfully embed the school's ethos across all activities, encouraging pupils to strive for excellence. Assemblies themed around excelling and historical examples of alumni achievements enforce this ethos"


"Teaching fosters linguistic development across all year groups ... teachers actively support mathematical development through structured lessons and effective questioning that challenges pupils ... the curriculum in aesthetic and creative subjects inspires and challenges pupils"

"Recreational activities complement academic learning, broadening pupils' skills through sports, drama and creative pursuits. A wide range of extra-curricular options, such as chess, debating, crocheting and writing clubs, promotes teamwork, leadership and well-rounded development"

"Leaders actively promote pupils' wellbeing through support structures such as wellbeing rooms and sensory spaces. Strong anti-bullying messages and forums for pupils to share their views enable leaders to identify concerns promptly and foster a positive school culture"

Inspections come reasonably thick and fast these days, but this latest one, conducted under a new framework, has given rise to some encouraging and validatory judgements. Education is not a zero–sum game. All balls can be rolled up the hill at the same time. It is pleasing that others, ISI and The Good Schools Guide before them, have noted our efforts to make constant, incremental progress in all areas. The inclusivity, warmth and humanity of BGS has been recognised. So too has our pursuit of excellence and the highest standards, be that with regards to pupil behaviour or, for example, achievements in the exam hall, theatre or tennis court. Long will that continue.

Colleagues at BGS share a common purpose, we apply ourselves in good faith and seek to do the best we can. That is also true of our efforts to foster a cohesive and vibrant Old Bradfordian community and enable and support individual alumni to keep in touch with each other and our School. We are organising a greater number of social events than ever before.

A MESSAGE FROM GORDON GREEN OBA PRESIDENT



OBA CHANGES APPROVED

At an Extraordinary General Meeting of Members held on 6th March, changes in the future of the structure of the Old Bradfordians Association were approved. The Committee had for some time been considering the future of the Association in its existing form bearing in mind the difficulty in recruiting new committee members and the changes in the demographics of the local Bradford area.

In recent times the Association has been dependent on the School in a number of ways – in particular the management of the large membership database and, more recently, the organisation of OBA social events.

This has enabled such events to be held both locally and at various locations throughout the country and further afield. Following a number of meetings with the Headmaster, the OBA Committee and the School agreed on a course of action which was ratified by the membership at the EGM.

In summary the new arrangements are:

- The OBA will in future be managed by the School Development Department.
 Consequently there will be no OBA Committee or President.
- The OBA funds of approximately £120,000 will be donated to the School. The majority of
 this will be allocated to the Assisted Places Fund with a substantial amount going to a new
 fund intended to support needy former pupils in their undergraduate studies at University.

The retiring OBA Committee recognises that these changes, which have the full support of the School, form a significant change in the way of running the OBA, but feel that they will strengthen the OBA and reinvigorate its activities under a new management team. At the same time, the proposed donation of our funds will assist the lives of both current and future Old Bradfordians for years to come.

BAFTA BHONOUROFFORDOB AIDY

An Old Bradfordian who has used his platform as an award-winning television presenter and writer to change perceptions around Tourette syndrome and neurodiversity has been accepted onto a prestigious national arts programme.



Aidy Smith (2009) has joined BAFTA's Connect Program which aims to support emerging talents who are trailblazers for inclusivity and representation across the TV and film industry.

Aidy was diagnosed with Tourette's when he was aged seven and has gone on to become the co-host and producer of the hit Amazon Prime television show, The Three Drinkers, which has been aired in 130 countries in 30 different languages; write various drinks columns for the national press, such as The Independent, and have drinks segments on various radio shows, including BBC Radio London.

He has spent years campaigning to educate and inspire others about Tourette's, which causes people to make involuntary sounds and movements, as well as about neurodiversity, having been also diagnosed with ADHD two years ago.

Aidy is heavily involved in charities such as The ADHD Foundation Neurodiversity Charity, of which he is a Patron, and the world's largest Tourette's charity, the Tourette Association of America, for which he is Global Ambassador. He has created a number of inspiring radio and television documentaries about both Tourette Syndrome and ADHD which have appeared on broadcast media such as BBC Radio 4 and Virgin Radio.

Speaking about his latest achievement with BAFTA he said: "Ever since I was a little boy, I remember watching the BAFTA Awards in complete awe. To be able to walk into that building in Piccadilly knowing that I'm now a part of such a talented and creative community of people is a 'pinch me' moment to say the least."



The ambition with BAFTA is to promote television shows which normalise neurodivergence, where people who are neurodiverse become the heroes and champions of the television series. I'm looking forward to talking to a number of different commissioners and tv channels about these ideas."

"I want to continue to inspire, educate and raise awareness and help a whole new generation understand that they belong and that there's a place for them at the table."












ALUMNI EVENTS XV RUGBY BGS V COLFES
